# Report

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## 2019-2020:

## 1. William Shakespeare's birth celebration-

23<sup>rd</sup> April 2019- The department of English celebrated English language day on 23<sup>rd</sup>April, 2019 to commemorate the birth anniversary of William Shakespeare. Head of the department, Dr. R. K. Mishra addressed the gathering after garlanding the portrait of Shakespeare. He also elaborated the work of Shakespeare along with the importance it holds in student's life. Faculty members: Dr. S. N. Pandey, Dr. R.P.Singh, Sanjeev lakra and a good number of students participated in the program. Students also quoted some most popular lines from one of the greatest tragedy of Shakespearehamlet, "To be, or not to be, that is the question: Whether 'tis nobler in the mind to sufferthe slings and arrows of outrageous fortune, Or to take arms against a sea of troubles and by opposing end them." The context in which it was originally quoted by prince hamlet and the present scenario is compared and contrasted.

#### 2. Book discussions-

22 October 2019- Anna Karenina by Leo Tolstoy: Discussion conducted in the presence of faculty members and students of English literature. *Anna Karenina* by Russian author Leo Tolstoy was first published in its complete form in 1878 after having been published in instalments between 1875 and 1877. Nagma khatun initiated the discussion with character portrayal, Priya das and Jyoti Bhattacharya told about the plot of the novel, Shweta Mishra and SwetaKundu discussed about the complex themes of love, morality, social norms in 19<sup>th</sup> century imperial Russia as wellas the blessings of family life, and the philosophical value of farming present in the novel.

10 December 2019— The Waste Land by T. S. Eliot: The event was organized on behalf of English literary association of college under the guidance of Dr. R. K. ## 1. William Shakespeare's birth celebration-
