#### Surguja District and Rajeev Gandhi Govt. P.G. College Ambikapur

#### Introduction

Surguja, a district rich in history, is characterized by its northern tropical deciduous forests and a vibrant tribal population. Located within the Chhota Nagpur plateau, it is bordered by the majestic Satpura-Maikal mountain ranges and is traversed by the ancient Renuka and Kanhar rivers. As one of the northern districts of Chhattisgarh, Surguja was carved from Madhya Pradesh and spans approximately 16,044.2 square kilometers, positioned between latitudes 22°38' to 24°6' north and longitudes 82°38' to 84°5' east. It shares borders with Sidhi, Sonbhadra (U.P.), and Palamu (Jharkhand) to the north, Korba to the south, and Jashpur to the east, with Korea district enclosing its western side.

#### **Education Initiatives**

To meet the critical need for higher education in this tribal region, the Government of Madhya Pradesh established a degree college in Ambikapur, the district headquarters, in 1960. Initially offering undergraduate programs in Science, Arts, and Commerce, Government P.G. College Ambikapur transitioned from Sagar University to Ravishankar University and now operates under Surguja University since 2009. The college gained autonomy for postgraduate courses in 1994-95 and for undergraduate courses in 2021-2022, aligning with UGC objectives to enhance access to higher education for students from Scheduled Tribes (ST), Scheduled Castes (SC), and Other Backward Classes (OBC).

# **Academic Offerings**

In 1972, the college expanded by introducing a three-year LL.B program and was elevated to a postgraduate institution. Current academic offerings include M.Sc. in various sciences and M.A. in disciplines such as Hindi, English, and History. The faculty comprises 78 members, including 31 Ph.D. holders, supported by 21 non-teaching and 10 technical staff. The college serves 6113 students—3781 boys and 2332 girls—with notable representation from ST (35.57%), SC (5.13%), and OBC (26.77%) categories.

#### **Facilities and Resources**

The college features a central library with 53,576 books and a departmental library containing 16,784 books, enriching students' academic resources. It offers comprehensive sports facilities for both indoor and outdoor activities, alongside amenities such as bicycle and vehicle stands, a girls' common room, pure drinking water, a canteen, and a well-maintained garden.

# **Teaching and Learning Approaches**

The institution encourages academic flexibility, allowing students to choose from various UG/PG programs. Evaluation methods include unit tests, quarterly assessments, seminars, and group discussions to cater to both slow and advanced learners. Remedial classes are available for those needing extra support, while advanced students are encouraged to deepen their knowledge through specialized activities, including field trips and practical experiments in departments like Geography, Botany, and Zoology.

# **Quality Assurance and Faculty Development**

An Autonomous Cell oversees postgraduate evaluations, while the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) ensures quality maintenance. Student feedback is regularly collected to assess teaching effectiveness, and faculty members are encouraged to participate in workshops, seminars, and refresher courses to enhance their skills.

# **Research and Community Engagement**

The college is home to 13 recognized research centres offering Ph.D. programs across disciplines. Faculty members guide dissertations and projects, contributing to scholarly publications. Community engagement is fostered through extension activities via NCC, NSS, and the Red Cross, promoting responsible citizenship among students.

# **Infrastructure and Support Services**

The college's infrastructure includes administrative offices, smart-board equipped classrooms, laboratories, an auditorium, and a dedicated computer lab. A 22-acre playground and a gymnasium provide ample recreational space. The Jan Bhagidari Samiti plays a vital role in maintaining and enhancing college resources.

# **Student Support and Progression**

Prioritizing student welfare, the college maintains a disciplined environment. The Anti-Ragging and Discipline Committee ensures safety, while resources such as library access, computer facilities, and sports amenities enrich the student experience. Annual career guidance initiatives, youth festivals, and recognition of student achievements contribute to both personal and academic growth.

# **Management and Governance**

Managed under the regulations of the Government of Chhattisgarh's Higher Education Department, the college operates under the leadership of the Principal, supported by various committees. The collaborative spirit among teaching and non-teaching staff fosters an effective educational environment.

#### **Conclusion**

Government P.G. College Ambikapur stands as a beacon of hope and opportunity in a region where educational access is limited. Its commitment to academic excellence, community engagement, and holistic student development underscores its mission to empower the youth of Surguja and contribute to national progress.

# Objective and Scope of the Audit

The academic audit for R.G. Govt. P.G. College, Ambikapur, initiated by the Principal on July 10, 2022, aims to provide an independent assessment of the institution. An external peer team will evaluate key areas to determine the current state of the college and offer actionable suggestions for improvement.

- Objectives
- Teaching and Learning Methodology: Assess the effectiveness of teaching methods and learning experiences provided across various courses.
- Laboratory and Computer Facilities: Evaluate the functionality and accessibility of laboratories and computer resources for students.
- Examination and Evaluation System: Review the systems in place for conducting examinations and evaluating student performance.
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC): Examine the activities and impact of the IQAC in enhancing academic standards.
- Library and Research Facilities: Evaluate the services of the central library, research support, and available sports facilities.
- Social Outreach Programs: Analyze the effectiveness of community service initiatives, including NCC and NSS programs, on student development and community engagement.
- Alumni Contributions: Investigate the role of alumni in supporting college initiatives and overall development.
- Opportunities for Improvement: Identify areas for potential enhancement within the college's major functional domains.

The audit team will compile insights and recommendations aimed at improving the college's operations and educational offerings.

# Methodology

The audit process commenced with a preparatory meeting in July 2022, involving the Principal, IQAC Coordinator, Academic Council members, and Examination Controller. This meeting provided an overview of the college's facilities and activities.

• Audit Visit

On July 25, 2022, the audit team conducted a comprehensive visit, dedicating the entire day to engage with various departments. The visit included

- Departmental Interactions: Discussions with faculty and students to understand departmental dynamics and the overall educational experience.
- Facility Inspections: Assessments of laboratories, computer facilities, and the library to gather firsthand insights on resource availability and functionality.
- Document Review: Analysis of provided documents to support observations and conclusions drawn during the visit.

The audit committee compiled findings, offering observations and recommendations to enhance the college's operations and educational offerings.

# Brief Profile of the College

- Rajeev Gandhi Govt. P.G. College is committed to its vision of providing quality education through:
- Inclusivity: Welcoming students from diverse backgrounds, particularly first-generation learners.
- Holistic Development: Offering a range of academic and extracurricular activities to foster overall student growth.
- Community Service: Instilling a sense of social responsibility through community engagement initiatives.
- Entrepreneurship and Critical Thinking: Encouraging the development of entrepreneurial skills and critical thinking among students.
- Quality Research: Promoting high standards of research among both faculty and students.
- Awareness and Sensitivity: Raising awareness on ecological, human rights, and gender issues.

#### **Outreach and Activities**

- Student-Faculty Dynamics: Data regarding the faculty-to-student ratio and engagement levels during the 2021-2022 academic year will be analyzed to provide insights into the educational environment.

These findings will assist the college in identifying strengths and areas for improvement, ultimately enhancing its educational impact and community service.

Exams are conducted at the end of each semester, helping students develop a habit of continuous study without the need for cramming a large amount of material at once.

Assessment and Feedback

This system includes regular internal assessments, providing students with feedback on their progress, enabling them to focus on their weaker areas.

• Improved Resource Availability

With the semester system, students can complete the curriculum on time, allowing for better utilization of labs and other resources.

Overall, these factors contribute to reducing the academic workload for students in the semester system.

- Overcrowded Classes: Limited classroom availability often leads to larger class sizes, making it difficult for teachers to provide individual attention and support to students.
- Scheduling Conflicts: A lack of classrooms can result in tight schedules, forcing some classes to be held at inconvenient times or causing delays in starting classes.

#### Challenges of an Unautomated Library

An unautomated library can pose several difficulties for students, including:

- Time-Consuming Processes: Manual cataloging and checkout processes can lead to longer wait times, making it challenging for students to access materials quickly.
- Limited Access to Resources: Without automation, tracking availability and locations of books can be cumbersome, often resulting in students wasting time

- searching for resources that may not be on the shelves.
- Inefficient Information Retrieval: Students may find it difficult to locate specific information or books without a digital search system, hindering their research and study efforts.
- Lack of User-Friendly Services: An automated library may lack online access for catalog searches, limiting students' ability to browse resources from home or on-the-go.
- Increased Administrative Burden: Staff may face challenges in managing inventory and maintaining records manually, reducing their ability to assist students effectively.
- Reduced Engagement: Without modern technology, students may be less inclined to utilize library resources, leading to underutilization of valuable academic materials.

Improving library automation can enhance accessibility, efficiency, and overall user experience for students.

### Syllabus Structure: Semester System in UG and PG

The introduction of the semester system in both undergraduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) programs brings several advantages to the syllabus structure:

- Modular Curriculum: The syllabus is divided into smaller, manageable modules, allowing students to focus on specific topics and themes within a shorter time frame.
- Regular Updates: The semester system encourages frequent reviews and updates to the syllabus, ensuring that the curriculum remains relevant and aligned with current academic and industry standards.
- Continuous Assessment: With a structured syllabus, continuous assessment methods (like quizzes, assignments, and projects) can be integrated, providing ongoing feedback to students and reducing the pressure of a single final exam.
- Enhanced Flexibility: Students can select elective courses based on their interests, fostering a more personalized learning experience and allowing them to explore various fields.
- Balanced Workload: The distribution of subjects across semesters helps balance the academic workload, making it easier for students to manage their time and study effectively.
- Focus on Skill Development: The semester structure often includes practical

- components and workshops, emphasizing skill development alongside theoretical knowledge.
- Improved Engagement: The variety in courses and assessment methods keeps students engaged and motivated throughout their academic journey.
   Overall, the semester system enhances the educational experience by promoting a more organized, flexible, and dynamic syllabus structure in both UG and PG programs.

Facilities: Issues with washroom facilities were noted.

- Attendance Policy: The new attendance policy recognizes and rewards student participation in external programs, promoting holistic development and engagement beyond the classroom.
- Curriculum Relevance: Topics relevant to NET and GATE exams should be incorporated.
- Qualified Faculty: All professors are highly qualified.

Examination Scheduling: The implementation of a more flexible examination scheduling system aims to enhance the academic experience for students and address previous scheduling conflicts and stressors.

Internships: An extension of the internship period to at least one month is recommended for greater benefit.

*Syllabi Updates*: While the updated syllabus aligns well with student needs, feedback indicates that some papers, particularly in literature & Science subjects, are overly lengthy. This can hinder effective learning and engagement.

#### Content Review:

Conduct a thorough review of the syllabus content for literature subjects, identifying sections that may be redundant or overly detailed.

#### Prioritization of Key Themes:

Focus on essential themes, concepts, and texts. Streamlining the syllabus to emphasize core materials can enhance comprehension and retention.

# Modular Approach:

Break down lengthy papers into smaller, focused modules. This allows for deeper exploration of each topic without overwhelming students.

Optional Readings:

Introduce optional readings for students interested in exploring additional material. This way, the core syllabus remains concise while still catering to enthusiastic learners.

**Staffing Issues**: The college is currently facing staffing challenges, with a noticeable shortage of teaching staff relative to student enrollment. This situation can impact the quality of education and student support..

**Research Activity**: The college has achieved satisfactory levels of research activity, reflecting a commitment to academic inquiry and scholarly contribution. However, there is always potential for further growth and development in this area

Career Counseling: Regular sessions are provided
