Surguja District and Rajeev Gandhi Govt. P.G. College Ambikapur

Introduction

Surguja District, renowned for its rich cultural heritage and diverse ecological landscape, is located in the northern part of Chhattisgarh. This vibrant region features tropical deciduous forests and dynamic tribal communities, making it a unique part of the Chhota Nagpur plateau. Surguja is bordered by the majestic Satpura-Maikal mountain ranges and is traversed by the ancient Renuka and Kanhar rivers. Spanning approximately 16,044.2 square kilometers, it lies between latitudes 22°38' to 24°6' north and longitudes 82°38' to 84°5' east. The district shares boundaries with Sidhi, Sonbhadra (U.P.), and Palamu (Jharkhand) to the north, Korba to the south, and Jashpur to the east, with Korea District bordering its western side.

Education Initiatives

In response to the pressing need for higher education in this predominantly tribal region, the Government of Madhya Pradesh established a degree college in Ambikapur, the district headquarters, in 1960. Originally offering undergraduate programs in Science, Arts, and Commerce, Rajeev Gandhi Govt. P.G. College Ambikapur has evolved through various affiliations—from Sagar University to Ravishankar University—and has operated under Surguja University since 2009. The college gained autonomy for postgraduate courses in 1994-95 and for undergraduate courses in 2021-2022, aligning its objectives with the University Grants Commission (UGC) to enhance access to higher education for marginalized communities, particularly those from Scheduled Tribes (ST), Scheduled Castes (SC), and Other Backward Classes (OBC).

Academic Offerings

The college has significantly expanded its academic offerings, introducing a three-year LL.B. program in 1972 and elevating its status to a postgraduate institution. Today, it offers a variety of M.Sc. programs in Physics, Chemistry, and Mathematics, along with M.A. degrees in Hindi, English, and History. With a dedicated faculty of 80 members, including 36 Ph.D. holders, and supported by a robust team of 21 non-teaching and 10 technical staff, the college serves a total enrollment of 5072 students—2684 boys and . 2388 girls. Notably, representation from ST (35%), SC (4.35%), and OBC (25.23%) categories underscores the institution's commitment to inclusivity.

Facilities and Resources

The college is equipped with a modern central library housing 53,982 books, complemented by a departmental library with 16,832 titles, enriching academic resources for students. Comprehensive sports facilities support both indoor and outdoor activities, promoting physical well-being alongside academic pursuits. Additional amenities include bicycle and vehicle stands, a dedicated girls' common room, purified drinking water stations, a canteen, and beautifully maintained gardens that enhance the campus environment.

Teaching and Learning Approaches

The institution adopts innovative teaching and learning methodologies, promoting academic flexibility by allowing students to select from a diverse array of UG and PG programs. Evaluation methods are varied and include unit tests, quarterly assessments, seminars, and group discussions tailored to meet the needs of both slow and advanced learners. Remedial classes provide extra support, while advanced learners are encouraged to expand their knowledge through specialized activities, including field trips and practical experiments in disciplines like Geography, Botany, and Zoology.

Quality Assurance and Faculty Development

To maintain high academic standards, an Autonomous Cell oversees postgraduate evaluations, while the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays a crucial role in upholding educational quality. The college places a strong emphasis on student feedback, regularly gathering insights to assess teaching effectiveness. Faculty members are encouraged to participate in workshops, seminars, and refresher courses, fostering a culture of continuous professional development.

Research and Community Engagement

The college is home to 15 recognized research centers that offer Ph.D. programs across various disciplines. Faculty members actively mentor students in dissertation projects, contributing to a growing body of scholarly publications. Community engagement is a cornerstone of the institution's ethos, fostered through extension activities via the National Cadet Corps (NCC), National Service Scheme (NSS), and the Red Cross, instilling a strong sense of responsible citizenship among students.

Infrastructure and Support Services

The college boasts a well-equipped infrastructure, including administrative offices, smart-board equipped classrooms, specialized laboratories, an auditorium, and a dedicated computer lab. The expansive 22-acre playground and gymnasium provide ample recreational space for students. The Jan Bhagidari Samiti plays a vital role in the maintenance and enhancement of college resources, ensuring a conducive learning environment.

Student Support and Progression

The welfare of students is a top priority at the college, which maintains a disciplined and secure environment. The Anti-Ragging and Discipline Committee is proactive in ensuring safety, while essential resources such as library access, computer facilities, and sports amenities significantly enhance the student experience. The college organizes annual career guidance initiatives, youth festivals, and recognizes student achievements, all contributing to the personal and academic growth of its students.

Management and Governance

Operating under the auspices of the Government of Chhattisgarh's Higher Education Department, the college is managed by the Principal with the support of various committees. This collaborative spirit among teaching and non-teaching staff fosters an effective educational environment, encouraging innovation and academic excellence.

Conclusion

Rajeev Gandhi Govt. P.G. College Ambikapur stands as a beacon of hope and opportunity in a region where access to quality education is often limited. Its unwavering commitment to academic excellence, community engagement, and holistic student development underscores its mission to empower the youth of Surguja and contribute to national progress. Objective and Scope of the Audit

The academic audit for Rajeev Gandhi Govt. P.G. College, Ambikapur, initiated by the Principal on June 15, 2024 aims to provide an insightful and constructive assessment of the institution. An external peer team will evaluate key areas, highlighting the college's strengths while identifying actionable opportunities for enhancement.

Objectives

- Teaching and Learning Methodology: Assess the effectiveness of innovative teaching methods and enriching learning experiences across various courses.
- Laboratory and Computer Facilities: Evaluate the functionality and accessibility of laboratories and computer resources, ensuring they effectively meet student needs.
- Examination and Evaluation System: Review the systems for conducting examinations and evaluating student performance, emphasizing fairness, efficiency, and transparency
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC): Examine the impactful activities of the IQAC in maintaining and enhancing academic standards and quality assurance.
- Library and Research Facilities: Assess the exceptional services of the central library, the robust research support available, and the adequacy of sports facilities for fostering student engagement
- Social Outreach Programs: Analyze the effectiveness of community service initiatives, including NCC and NSS programs, in promoting student development and positive community engagement.
- Alumni Contributions: Investigate the vital role of alumni in supporting college initiatives and overall development, showcasing their contributions to institutional growth.
- Opportunities for Improvemen : Identify areas for

potential enhancement within the college's major functional domains, aligning with its educational goals and community impact.

The audit team will compile valuable insights and actionable recommendations to strengthen the college's operations and educational offerings.

Methodology

The audit process commenced with a preparatory meeting in June 2024, uniting key stakeholders such as the Principal, IQAC Coordinator, members of the Academic Council, and the Examination Controller. This collaborative meeting established a comprehensive overview of the college's facilities, activities, and aspirations.

Audit Visit

On June 24, 2024 the audit team conducted an engaging visit, dedicating the entire day to connect with various departments. The visit included:

- Departmental Interactions: Inspiring discussions with faculty and students to understand departmental dynamics and the enriching educational experience.
- Facility Inspections: Thorough assessments of laboratories, computer facilities, and the library to gain firsthand insights into the availability and functionality of resources.
- Document Review: In-depth analysis of provided documents to support observations and constructive conclusions drawn during the visit.

The audit committee compiled its findings, offering positive observations and recommendations to enhance the college's operations and educational offerings.

Brief Profile of the College

Rajeev Gandhi Govt. P.G. College is dedicated to its vision of providing quality education through:

- Inclusivity: Welcoming students from diverse backgrounds, with a special emphasis on supporting first-generation learners.
- Holistic Development: Offering a wide range of academic and extracurricular activities that foster comprehensive student growth and personal development.
- Community Service: Instilling a profound sense of social responsibility through active engagement in community initiatives.
- Entrepreneurship and Critical Thinking: Encouraging the development of entrepreneurial skills and critical thinking, empowering students to become innovative leaders.

This aligns with the NEP's vision of promoting holistic education and prepares students to thrive in a dynamic educational landscape.

- Reputation: R.G. Govt. P.G. College Ambikapur is celebrated as a premier institution, attracting students for its diverse academic offerings and nurturing, inclusive environment. The NEP's emphasis on flexibility and inclusivity complements the college's mission to provide accessible, high-quality education, fostering creativity, critical thinking, and lifelong learning. This commitment enriches the student experience and positions the college as a leader in higher education within the region.
- Student-Faculty Dynamics: An analysis of the faculty-tostudent ratio and engagement levels during the 2023-2024 academic year will provide insights into the vibrant educational environment.

These findings will assist the college in recognizing its strengths and embracing opportunities for improvement, ultimately enhancing its educational impact and commitment to community service.

Expanding the number of classrooms will improve the learning environment and reduce overcrowding. Additionally, upgrading and constructing staff washrooms is essential for faculty comfort and well-being. Addressing these infrastructure needs will significantly enhance the educational atmosphere for both students and staff.

Attendance Policy

Curriculum Relevance
